

Counselor's Corner -Talking to Your Child About School

Most of the time when a parent asks their child how the day went at school, we as parents get the pat answers such as "OK or, boring, or fun, or nothing happened". When asked what was something they learned the child says "nothing, stuff, or lots of things". When asked what were the best things that happened at school a lot of children will reply "recess or everything". As a parent I would often get frustrated by these remarks until I started asking more open ended/targeted questions that required my child to elaborate about their school day. Some ideas to try are:

*Tell me what book your teacher read today. Can you retell me the story? What did you like about the book?

*What was one funny thing that happened with a friend today?

*Who did you play with at recess and what did you play?

*What game did you play in math today?

*How was (PE, Music, Art). What activity did you do there...did you learn a new game, song, what did you create in art?

It is important to model conversation skills with your child by talking about your day and/ or through role play. Children need to learn that eye contact, body language, and warmth in their voice are all important when carrying on a conversation. These skills will help them as they meet new people and make new friends.

If your child tells you that s/he is being teased or picked on by a classmate or on the bus; or if they are refusing to go to school, please contact the teacher or the school counselor to help determine what is going on, so that together we can solve the problem. We are a team and want a safe environment for you child to grow and learn.

Wellness Information

Parents are frequently concerned about the decision of when to keep their children home, or send them to school. The following information is intended to help you with this decision:

Children should stay home if they:

- Have a **fever** of 100 degrees or more, and should remain at home for 24 hours after the temperature returns to normal without medication.
- **Vomited** or have had **diarrhea**, and should remain at home for 24 hours after it has stopped.
- Been diagnosed with **strep throat** (stay home until on antibiotic for 24 hours).
- Have a **persistent cough**.
- Have a rash that is spreading or draining.
- Have red, inflamed or **draining eyes**.

If your child is ill, please call the school attendance to report the illness.

The annual **Flu Shot Clinic is Saturday October 18, 2014 from 9 am to 12 pm** in the MAMS cafeteria. This is a free clinic with donations accepted. The public is invited; parents or guardians must accompany minors. **Booster clinic date is Tuesday November 18th from 4pm to 6 pm** and this is for all, not just for the booster needed for young children.
